

THE IMPORTANCE OF **ART IN MONTESSORI**

Nurturing Creativity & Expression

rt holds immense value in human societies, capturing the beauty of the world and enhancing our lives by fulfilling our aesthetic needs. It serves as a powerful means of expressing thoughts, perceptions, and stories, acting as a reservoir of collective human experience. Art refines the senses, sharpens observation and thoughtful perception, and embraces a sense of wonder.

At the heart of the Montessori approach is a profound appreciation for the arts, which plays a crucial role in the holistic development of young minds. The Montessori method uniquely shares the beauty of art with children, nurturing the artist within each child. It provides them with opportunities to fulfill a fundamental need to connect with nature and the world around them, allowing for deep and meaningful self-expression. In a Montessori classroom, art is not its own subject, but is integrated throughout the materials and lessons. It enables the freedom to express oneself creatively, coupled with skills honed through dedicated practice.

The Montessori Environment

From the moment a child sets foot in our school, their attention is drawn to the order, beauty, and detail in the environment. Montessori guides take great effort in preparing an aesthetically pleasing and curated environment with intentionally placed art, plants, flowers, and objects of cultural interest that draw a child's attention. This environment balances homelike comfort with the reverence one might feel in a museum, inspiring children to take pride in their surroundings and their artistic endeavors. Art materials are thoughtfully arranged and easily accessible, inviting children to engage with them spontaneously.

Observing and an Eye for Detail

From a very young age, children are guided to observe closely. Every lesson draws a child's attention to careful movements, parts of a material, or even the tiniest spill. This aids concentration and creates an eye for detail. Ample opportunities to observe nature or even each other give children time to absorb their environment and formulate their thoughts.

Refining the Senses

Specific exercises for young children are designed to isolate and refine particular qualities perceived by the senses, such as size, shape, composition, texture, loudness, softness, matching, weight, and temperature. The iconic pink tower, color tablets, and bells are beautiful materials that refine the senses while allowing the child artistic expression as they manipulate them. Work in geometry continues to provide opportunities for manipulation and careful distinction between shapes. Children are guided to listen to bird calls, identify shapes of leaves, and look closely at the adaptations of flowers or types of mountains, leading them to notice or listen with their senses and create a deep sense of wonder about the natural world.

Appreciating Global Cultures

Art in Montessori education serves as a window into diverse cultures and the various ways artistic expression can take form. Children explore works of art from







different time periods, ranging from the earliest cave paintings to contemporary artists. They listen to music or folk tales and enjoy dances and movements from around the world. Exposure to a variety of literature opens windows into different worlds, sharing perspectives and provoking thought. Elementary children learn that art is a fundamental human need that has been fulfilled in various ways across space and time. This cultural appreciation broadens their horizons, finding commonalities and instilling a sense of respect for different perspectives.

Art in the Young Children's Community BY JAMIE GILBERT, YCC GUIDE

In the Montessori Young Children's Community, we provide open-ended art activities that help children explore their inner creativity while also working on fine motor skills. Art is integrated into daily activities, allowing toddlers to explore their creativity through hands-on experiences. Children

engage in painting, drawing, and simple crafts that help develop fine motor skills and hand-eye coordination. The use of natural materials like clay and leaves introduces them to the textures and forms found in nature. Music and movement are also vital components of our daily classroom, with rhythm and dance fostering self-expression and joy.

Adults tend to focus on the finished product of their work or efforts. Young children interact with the world differently, deriving joy from the process. Thus, we focus on process over product. Like all work in Montessori, art has a deeper purpose for future skill sets. For example, drawing on the chalkboard helps prepare the child for writing.

The child's art journey in YCC helps develop their appreciation of intrinsic beauty, from which we can all benefit.

Art in the Primary Classroom

Adults tend to have vague ideas about creativity and art in a Montessori Primary environment. They think of self-expression in an art form, for example: paint to paper. But in reality, for a young child the product may or may not have any great meaning to the child. As a culture we are always focused on the product of our efforts. We must realize and remember that the children are interested only in the process.

In the Primary classroom, art becomes a tool for self-expression and communication. Children are introduced to various art techniques, including drawing, painting, and sculpting. Metal Insets and cursive handwriting exercises develop fine motor skills, while storytelling and dramatic play encourage imaginative expression. The integration of music and movement helps children understand rhythm, melody, and harmony.

Every day I witness so many unique expressions of art. The artful way one child chooses to arrange language cards, the colors chosen to do a sewing card or embroidery, the flowers gathered for an arrangement or the color choices for a painting. All expressions are unique and equally valued. Depending upon the lens you employ, art and creativity are part and parcel throughout the Montessori classroom.

Art in the Elementary Environment

In the Montessori Elementary classroom, art is a universal language. While it stands as its own subject, it is beautifully integrated across the curriculum connecting math, language, geometry, biology, and history.

To the highly imaginative mind of the Elementary child, stories from history are told to showcase the role of art in human society as a language, a form of expression and a fundamental spiritual need from the beginning of our time.



When learning complex concepts like color theory, gradation, shading, proportion and perspective, children often use real-life observations from nature to inform their work. They apply mathematical principles to create beautiful, precise drawings that reflect both artistic and intellectual growth. This connection between art, language, nature, math, and history are profound, as they reveal the child's emerging understanding of the interconnectedness of all things.

Children may apply these skills by illustrating their academic work. Whether they paint a whale for a research project, connect Mondrian's art to squaring in math, or understand the refraction of light as a rainbow through color theory, art enables them to visualize their learning in new ways.

Dr. Montessori believed that art is essential for the child's development—spiritually, intellectually, and

psychologically as it connects the hand, heart and the mind. Art helps the child develop concentration, self-expression, and creativity, offering a pathway to deep focus which then can then apply to many aspects of their learning.

Montessori Art is about *process* over the finished product.

The Montessori Artistic Journey

Art in the Montessori classroom is a journey that begins with the pure joy of exploration in the Young Children's Community, deepens into purposeful expression in the Primary years, and blossoms into a tool for understanding and communicating complex ideas in the Elementary classroom. Across all levels, art is more than just an activity; it's a vital part of the child's development, fostering creativity, self-expression, and a deeper connection to the world around them. By nurturing these artistic impulses, Montessori education helps children grow into thoughtful, imaginative individuals who appreciate the beauty and diversity of human expression.











In the Cobb Art Studio

In addition to the beautiful art program integrated throughout our Montessori curriculum and in the classrooms, Cobb Elementary students are fortunate to work with Chris Lyles, professional children's illustrator and our Artist-in-Residence for the last twenty years.

In his own words, "During my time here I have learned far more from the children than they have learned from me. Being a working illustrator allows me to demonstrate my process from initial sketch to realized vision with the students, and stress the importance of conceptual thinking and visual problem-solving. We explore a variety of mediums on any given project, while allowing

happy accidents along the way. Students create openly and freely without the fear of rejection or making mistakes—as our focus is always on the process, not the finished product. Critiques are provided along the way to help guide them, but never interfering with their own personal vision and creativity. Personal expression is of the utmost importance and by the end of the sixth-year cycle, students

have created a well developed portfolio of work showcasing their artistic voice and spirit. Many of our students will exhibit their artwork locally, giving them real life experience and exposure, providing greater opportunities and introspective of their work. Each day in the art studio is a new adventure and opportunity to forget about time and get lost in imagination and creativity. As Picasso once said, "Every child is an artist, the problem is how to remain an artist once we grow up." I suppose I feel I've never really grown up so I will keep creating right alongside these wonderful little artists!"














Montessori & the Creative Spark



I was honored to play in the Augusta National Women's Amateur which includes the 72 best female amateur golfers in the world. My Montessori background gave me the confidence to focus on the process and to appreciate my experience. I was able to play well and did several interviews with the press over the week. The communication skills I learned at Cobb School allowed me to present myself in a mature, yet friendly, manner with multiple questions asked of me on camera.

From developing strong interpersonal skills to fostering independence, problem-solving abilities, and creativity, the foundation laid in my Montessori upbringing continues to influence every aspect of my life. As I start the next chapter of my journey, I carry with me the lessons and skills I learned at Cobb School, giving me confidence in my ability to tackle whatever challenges come my way.

Carol Ebersol's Montessori journey was inspired by a simple observation of a grammar lesson in a Montessori classroom in the late 1970s. She has since dedicated her life to sharing her love for language, nature, and the work of the hand with children. After twenty eight years in well known Montessori schools, she has made her home at Cobb for the last 16 years.

Q. What drew you to the Primary classroom specifically?

I love young children so it seemed a natural place for me. When I started most Montessori programs only offered Primary classrooms. I was drawn to the mixed age group learning. I love being 100% present with them, hearing their stories, and I adore the process of reading.

Q. Have children changed over the course of your teaching career?

Yes, I have noticed changes. In the early days, children were more inclined to practice lessons they received without being encouraged to do so. I've also noticed a decline in hand strength among children. "Never give more to the eyes than you give to the hands," is my motto. It encourages children to interact with the world around them, rather than being a passive observer.

Q.What advice do you have for parents of Primary-aged children?

This age isn't about results, it's about the process. Giving children the opportunity and space to focus and become fully absorbed in what they're doing fosters a great ability to focus on things later. When you transition a child to a new task, like cleaning up for dinner, give them the respect

and the opportunity to finish their work. A gentle "I see that you're busy, could you please finish up and clean up for dinner," lets them know that their work is important too.

Marisa Gallagher began her journey at Cobb over 30 years ago as Mary Lou Cobb's assistant and Spanish program director, followed by Montessori training. Since then, she has been an inspiring lead guide in our Primary classroom, touching the lives of hundreds of children with her unwavering love and deep belief in each child.

Q. What drew you to Montessori?

This pedagogy is unique in its holistic view of the child. It is centered around the belief in the potential that all children have. Every aspect of the pedagogy is brilliantly designed based on scientific observations of children while nurturing the needs of the human spirit. We empower them with independence and guide them to be community members. Montessori principles are a gift to the child and give us hope for the world.

Q. What is your role as guide?

The role of a guide is beautifully captured in our mission statement — Believe, Guide, Step Aside and Let Fly. First and foremost, my role is to believe in every child: to see them and honor them for everything that they are. I guide them by drawing their interest and showing them how to be and how to work in our environment. When they are connected with their work, I step aside and observe closely until they are ready to fly! An important part of my role also includes closely partnering with the parents who are key to the child's development and guiding them through understanding the child's journey.

Q. Why is the 3-year cycle important?

The design of the 3-year cycle serves many purposes. Firstly, our environments are designed and prepared for the development stage of the child which spans over roughly 3-4 years. We have an extensive curriculum in the environment and children will develop interest and readiness over different time periods. So this allows for individualization and lets the child work at their pace. The experience of growing from a new child to the elder in the same community, gives a child a great sense of confidence, responsibility, leadership and mastery of skills. It is also a tremendous opportunity to form deeper connections both with their peers and with me. These connections carry them throughout their life.

Karen Gavell

After a varied career including her work as a designer for a children's clothing company, Karen discovered Montessori first as a parent. The pedagogy called to her and since 2000 she has been steadfast in her mission to guide children toward their independence. She came to Cobb eight years ago and finds joy in her work every day.



Q. What drew your to Montessori?

Discovering Montessori happened quite organically for me; it was a journey guided by my own young children. As we began to consider their educational path, I wanted an environment that supported their natural curiosity and their developmental needs. The Montessori philosophy resonated deeply with my beliefs about education and child development.

Q. What is your favorite thing about working with Primary-aged children?

I love everything about working with the children! It's the little moments we observe sometimes that I love the most. It's those little moments when a child makes a discovery and their entire being lights up and they continue to repeat the same work over and over again for the sheer joy!







Established in 2009 by David Castellani and Helen Thomas because they believe that Cobb is a model of excellence, providing children with an authentic Montessori education.


RAINERIO O. REYES ENDOWMENT


